Access to decent and affordable housing for all in communities which are socially, economically and environmentally sustainable and where all are enabled to reach their full potential.






Structure

- It is organized in five (5) thematic Working Committees open to all members






Background

In November 2014, the Taskforce of the EU on the **Investment Plan stated:** "... shrinking regional and municipal budgets are having a negative impact on urban social services, including the provision of social housing in several Member State". Housing Europe shares this view and stresses again the need for financial support to affordable housing in the EU for the construction of new homes, for sustainable schemes to prevent eviction for the conversion of empty private properties into social housing as well as for the refurbishment of existing homes and adaptation of homes for aging population The economic and societal impact of investing in the housing is now well documented.




Fewer affordable homes




The housing situation in the EU

- > 25.7 million people in the EU are in a situation of severe housing deprivation (European Social Housing Observatory)
 - overcrowding & bad dwelling quality
- On average Europeans spend over 1/5 of their income (22.9%) on Housing
 - 12.2% of European households and 39.1% of those with income below 60% of median equalised income spend > 40% of their disposable income on housing = they are *overburdened* by housing costs (Eurostat)










Energy poor Rest of EU population

- **51 million Europeans cannot pay their energy bills**, which means they often cannot heat their homes in winter.
- In total, between 50 and 125 million people are living in energy poverty in Europe, because of the poor quality of their housing.

• Why is it important?

- It is the first the EU is taking a holistic approach on Energy
- It is part of a bigger puzzle in light of the EU contribution to Climate Summit in Paris in December 2015



The EU needs a citizen-oriented Energy Union

- The housing sector holds the key to a fair energy transition
 - buildings not only account for 40% of the overall energy consumption in Europe but, with the right incentive and policy framework, also hold the key to a fair energy transition
- A successful Energy Union requires the **trust of citizens**
 - Empowering and involving citizen-consumers and communities will be key to unlocking the full potential of every green energy transition strategy. (EKYL demonstrated in its work how important trust of citizens is!)
- What can the EU do?
 - 1. positive long-term European and national incentives and regulation
 - 2. Funding to further boost refurbishments (20% of ERDF to low-carbon economy AND a share of the Juncker Plan)



A win-win mix



- Better quality of life and savings on energy bills is already a reality in many EU countries that can be used as best practices and guidelines
- Extensive monitoring (HIVE online energy consumption tracker) of 13 case studies in Bulgaria, Estonia and Italy over the last 3 years has proven the added value of a bottom up approach in order to achieve the expected results in terms of energy savings, costs, behavioral change and - last but not least - indoor comfort
- No space for one fits all solution but the potential within any given geographical and societal context should be examined – This is the focus of Power House Europe initiative – Cold Climates, Med Climates, Divided/Cooperative Ownership, Finance
- Finance Taskforce Adapted finance and regulatory Schemes One of Keys to success
